Highlights

The regular meeting of the Central Bucks Detachment #636 of the Marine Corps League of Pennsylvania, Inc., was held December 10, 1997, at the Albert E. Atkinson American Legion Post #210, 315 North St., Doylestown, PA.

There were 19 members present including all officers except the Senior Vice Commandant, the Adjutant and the Quartermaster. Distinguished Marines in attendance included: **National Public Relations Officer Don Gee** ; **Past Commandants Don Parzanese Sr., Bill Plant, Frank Yohe** , and **Don Gee**; **Past Commandant of the Department of New Jersey Ed Hoth** ; and **Marine of the Year Paul Caprio** .

The Minutes of the November Meeting were unanimously approved.

Paymaster Bob Cody issued the Paymaster's Report. The report was unanimously accepted.

Commandant Bud Pearce reported several members of the Detachment had taken part in a Funeral Detail at the request of All Division Detachment. Our members served as part of the Firing Squad and All Divisions Detachment sent a "Thank You" note for their participation. The Detachment also received a note from the Marckstein family expressing appreciation for the flowers sent for **Marine Jim Marckstein's** mother's funeral.

Senior Vice Commandant - absent. The Detachment has 48 members on the rolls. We have 15 Life Members, 27 Regular Members and 6 Associate Members. There are three members delinquent in their dues. **Judge Advocate Bill Plant, PC** , suggested a committee be formed to contact delinquent members to determine why they were not renewing their membership. Benedict Arnold's Boat Found in Lake

A Revolutionary War gunboat, part of a small fleet commanded in a strategic battle by Benedict Arnold before he turned traitor, has been found nearly intact on the bottom of Lake Champlain, officials said recently.

No decision has been made yet on whether to leave the ship in place or raise it, said **Art Cohn**, head of the Lake Champlain Maritime Museum. The ship's exact location in the 115-mile-long lake and its depth were not released.

The 54-foot vessel, whose name is not yet known, is "in an excellent state of preservation, sitting upright on the bottom, its mast still standing more than 50 feet high and its large bow cannon still in place," Cohn said.

It was found recently during a sonar survey of the lake bottom, he said.

Only four vessels survived out of the 15-ship squadron led by Arnold in the Battle of Valcour Island in 1776.

Cohn told reporters he went on the first dive to the ship. His attention was focused on the complicated dive procedures, he said, but "at the same time there was a voice screaming in my head 'Oh my God, this is the gunboat! Benedict Arnold probably walked on this deck'."

The newly discovered ship was identified as one of Arnold's flotilla because it matches another of his gunboats, the *Philadelphia*, which was found in 1935 and is at the Smithsonian Institution.

Peter Barranco, the historian on the discovery team, said he was sure what had been found as soon as he saw it on the sonar. "There was never any doubt in my mind that it was there. History had told us so," he said.

"This could prove to be the most significant maritime discovery in American history in the last half century," said **Philip Lundeborg**, curator emeritus of naval history at the Smithsonian's American History Museum. "The apparently excellent condition of the gunboat is highly unusual for an artifact this old and is one of the reasons the discovery is so significant."

The lake's cold water, up to 409

feet deep, is credited with preserving a number of wrecks that have been found in the lake in recent years.

Lake Champlain, which divides New York and Vermont, was of strategic importance in the Revolutionary War because it extends north into Canada.

American forces, led by Arnold, met the British fleet Oct. 11., 1776, at the Battle of Valcour Island. While Arnold's fleet was forced to retreat, their efforts delayed the impending British invasion for a year, giving the Colonists more time to bolster future defense. Arnold later switched sides, giving the British information about American plans.

CONGRESS SEEKS TO LOOSEN V-A REGS

Congress recently moved to open the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) health care to more of this country's veterans. The Senate Veterans Affairs Committee approved by voice vote, a draft bill designed to loosen rules for those who seek VA outpatient care. Within a week, the House of Representatives voted 416-0 to pass HR 3118, legislation similar to the Senate bill.

Under the provisions of both bills, they would cap VA health care appropriations at \$17 billion in FY 1998. VA would also set up a new priority system

for treating veterans, with service-connected disabled veterans continuing to receive top priority and other categories of veterans receiving care as the budget allowed. Further, VA would be given greater flexibility to treat veterans through outpatient care and by contracting services to the private sector. It would eliminate some current VA rules that limit outpatient care to a select group of veterans. Current law requires veterans to check into a VA hospital before they can be treated at an outpatient clinic. Veterans currently receiving priority care

would be unaffected. They include service-connected disabled and indigent veterans, and veterans suffering from catastrophic illnesses. In addition, former prisoners of war and World War I veterans would be added.

While these bills together comprise an initial phase for VA health care reform, veterans groups are concerned about the impact these changes will have on services and treatment of priority category "C" veterans seeking VA health care. Supporters claim these changes will allow VA to treat veterans for less money.

Auxiliary Launches Easter Food Drive

"Bring a can or a box of food for the needy for Easter," is what the Central Bucks Auxiliary Unit is asking of Central Bucks Detachment members.

The Auxiliary, which will again be sharing the American Legion Post with the Detachment beginning in January, will have a container available for dona-

tions at our next meeting.

"We will collecting canned and boxed food items at each Detachment and Unit meeting until Easter," says Auxiliary Unit President Tammy Gee. "We need the Detachment's support to make this food drive successful," she states. The Easter Food Drive begins in January.

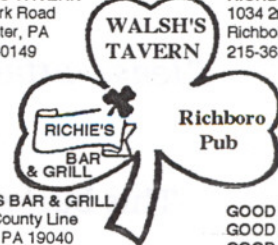


