

MARINES LEAVING OKINAWA, HEADED FOR GUAM

WASHINGTON — About 9,000 U.S. Marines stationed on the Japanese island of Okinawa will be moved to the U.S. territory of Guam and other locations in the Asia-Pacific, including Hawaii, under a U.S.-Japan agreement announced Apr. 26.

The move is part of a broader arrangement designed to tamp down tensions in the U.S.-Japan defense alliance stemming in part from opposition in Okinawa to what many view as a burdensome U.S. military presence.

It also reflects a desire by the Obama administration to spread U.S. forces more widely in the Asia-Pacific region as part of a rebalancing of U.S. defense priorities in the aftermath of a decade of war in the greater Middle East.

The agreement was outlined in a joint statement issued Apr. 26 by **Secretary** of State Hillary Rodham Clinton and **Defense Secretary Leon Panetta** and their Japanese counterparts.

Citing an "increasingly uncertain security environment" in the Asia-Pacific region, they said their agreement was intended to maintain a robust U.S. military presence to ensure the defense of Japan.

"Japan is not just a close ally, but also a close friend," Panetta said in a separate comment. "And I look forward to deepening that friendship and strengthening our partnership as, together, we address security challenges in the region."

The joint statement made no mention of a timetable for moving the approximately 9,000 Marines off of Okinawa. It said it would happen "when appropriate facilities are available to receive them" on Guam and elsewhere.

Under the new agreement, about 10,000 Marines will remain on Okinawa, which has been a key element of the U.S. military presence in Asia for decades. The U.S. also has a substantial Air Force presence on Okinawa.

"I think we have made some progress and this plan offers specific and for-

Alaska Mountain Named to Honor Korean War Vets

JUNEAU, AK--The Alaska Historical Commission on Mar. 29 named a mountain in honor of 3,000 soldiers killed in action in the Korean War Battle of the Chosin Reservoir. Mount Chosin Few, near Cordova, will commemorate veterans of the epic 1950 Korean War battle, including those from Alaska.

"The first question many Americans ask a Korean War veteran is: 'Were you at the Battle of the Chosin Reservoir?' That stands in history as one of the most difficult battles in modern times," said **Lieutenant Governor Mead Treadwell**, who chairs the commission. "It's unusual for Alaska to name mountains after an event. However, this cold, snowy place can help us remember sacrifices that thousands made in that harsh land. The commission felt we have mountains enough to honor these brave men," Treadwell said.

The Alaska Historical Commission is a forum for citizens' voices in the development of state history policy.

Chosin Few member **Richard Lilly** of Wasilla who, along with fellow Chosin Few member **John Beasley** of Palmer, is heading up the effort to name the peak, said it's not quite a done deal yet. The federal government still has to sign off on it, a process that can take as long as a year.

"Hopefully it'll go through. I don't know if this is the hardest part or not," he said. "It's for the guys--not for us, but for those other guys."

After settling on the idea, Beasley and Lilly collected letters of support.

Vic Voltaggio, National Commandant of the Marine Corps League, called it a "fitting tribute to those who never made it back."

Palmer Mayor DeLena Johnson said the effort "reminded me how much

OLDEST MARINE DEAD AT 105

DARBY, PA--**Alfred L. DeSerio**, a 42year Veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps who served in World War II, Korea and Vietnam, died Saturday, May 12, at the age of 105. He was believed to be the oldest living Marine in the country.

DeSerio was born and raised in Philadelphia. His family operated a bakery in the city and DeSerio would help deliver Italian bread on a horse-drawn carriage. Before he turned 18, he lied about his age to enlist in the Marines.

Eventually attaining the rank of Master Sergeant, DeSerio served in the Pacific Theater of World War II and in the Korean War and did two tours of duty in Vietnam. He retired from the military in 1970.

During World War II, one of DeSerio's duties was to escort the bodies of fellow Marines home to their families. It was a job he took very seriously.

"I was proud to do it," DeSerio said in an interview during his birthday celebration in November 2011. "After the funeral, you'd take the flag off the coffin and fold it up. The hardest thing to do was present the flag to the mother."

After leaving the service, DeSerio moved to Collingdale and was a maintenance worker at Mercy Fitzgerald Hospital in Darby until his retirement in 1988.

ward-looking action," said Japan's Foreign Minister Koichiro Gemba, who added that Japan wanted to "reduce the burden on Okinawa."

Japan, including Okinawa, is a linchpin of U.S. strategy for deterring aggression in the region and for reinforcing the Korean peninsula in the event North Korea attacked South Korea.

The Obama administration believes the new agreement with Japan will make the alliance more sustainable, while also giving the Marines more regional flexibility.

Between 4,700 and 5,000 Marines will relocate from Okinawa to Guam, according to a U.S. defense official who briefed reporters on some of the details before the agreement was official announced in Tokyo and Washington.

The remainder of the 9,000 who are to relocate from Okinawa will move to Hawaii or be part of a rotational presence in Australia and elsewhere in the region, the official said. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because he was previewing the official announcement.

The official would not say how many would be moved to Hawaii. Hawaii Gov. Neil Abercrombie said he expects around 2,700 Marines will be shifted there.

Of the \$8.6 billion estimated cost of relocating Marines to Guam, Japan agreed to pay \$3.1 billion, the official said. The total cost includes an unspecified amount for possible construction of new training ranges in the Northern Mariana Islands that could be used jointly by U.S. and Japanese forces, he said.

The agreement also calls for a phased return to Japanese control of certain parcels of land on Okinawa now used by the American military.

The shift of Marines from Okinawa to Guam has been in limbo for years because it was linked to the closure and replacement of Marine Corps Air Station Futenma. Okinawans fiercely oppose Futenma and believe the base should simply be closed and moved overseas or elsewhere in Japan. The U.S., however, has insisted that Japan find a Futenma replacement on Okinawa.

That issue remains unresolved.

we owe the soldiers who have given their lives to serve and protect us."

LtCol. Jack Nolan, USMC (Ret), President of The Chosin Few, Inc., said a peak named for the battle "would endure forever" and he could "think of no more significant means of honoring our current survivors and memorializing our beloved brothers."

U.S. Senator Lisa Murkowski's letter of support says "it is certainly fitting that the survivors of the campaign be honored in a public way while many of them are still alive."

The name change also won approval from the Mat-Su Borough Assembly,

which passed a resolution **Borough Mayor Larry DeVilbiss** penned in support.

Beasley noted that the mountain, 28 miles from Cordova, is inhospitable, with snow and severe weather.

"The environment is very similar to the Chosin Reservoir," Beasley said.

The battle occurred in November and December of 1950 when 18,000 Americans and Allied forces--mostly U.S. Marines--were sent into the mountains to march on North Korea.

A Chinese force four to five times the size of the allied forces surprised and surrounded them. The Marines lost 3,000 men fighting to break the encirclement. Fully 17 warriors were

awarded the Medal of Honor, the military's highest honor, for their bravery in the battle.

"The Chinese had orders to eliminate us," Beasley told the assembly. "We blocked their path to South Korea and the retaking of Seoul."

He said that the allies stopped the communists, inflicting 25,000 casualties, and made it back to the sea.

Sixty years later, the ranks of the survivors are dwindling. The Chosin Few Inc. has in its bylaws a requirement that members were present at the battle.

"A few more years and we're going to close up shop," Beasley said.

But a mountain bearing the name of the battle, he said, will live on.
