# Retired brass oppose Bill on gays

WASHINGTON — A group of retired military officers will try to persuade Congress to write into law the ban on homosexuals in the military that President Clinton seeks to overturn.

The creation of the Defense Readiness Council was announced at a news conference yesterday. Its purpose is "to stop a political effort bent on forcing the armed services to admit and accommodate homosexuals contrary to professional military judgment and experience."

The existing ban on homosexuals in the military is contained in a Defense Department directive issued in 1982. Before that, each service had rules providing

dishonorable discharges for anyone caught engaging in homosexual conduct. Those dated from World War II.

"The American people do not fund the American military for the purpose of social engineering," said retired Rear Adm. Clarence A. Hill Jr.

The retired officers said they have started a grass-roots campaign to persuade Clinton to withdraw his plan to allow homosexuals to serve openly in the armed services. They said they are attempting to raise money from veterans groups and others to lobby Congress to make the military ban on gays a federal law.

"I think Clinton is a pragmatic

politician, and we hope he will face up to the fact that most Americans don't support him on this," said retired Marine Lt. Gen. Charles G. Cooper.

Among the 21 members of the council's board of advisers is retired Adm. Thomas Moorer, who was chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff from 1970 to 1974. Others include retired Gens. Alfred M. Gray Jr. and Robert H. Barrow, both former Marine Corps commandants, and retired Gen. Charles L. Donnelly Jr., former commander of U.S. Air Forces in Europe.

In January, Clinton directed Defense Secretary Les Aspin to draft a regulation dropping the existing ban on homosexuals by July 15.

Dear Friend,

Thank you for letting me know of your opposition to lifting the ban on gays in the military.

As a veteran of the United States Army Air Corps, I believe that we cannot tolerate any kind of sexual misconduct in the armed forces, whether it is heterosexual or homosexual. Any actual conduct that harms the effectiveness, command structure or combat readiness of the military must be strictly prohibited. As the recent "Tailhook" scandal demonstrated, such inappropriate behavior can be committed by heterosexuals as well as by homosexuals.

There are already, and always have been, homosexuals serving honorably in the United States military. We have invested in their training and they are serving with distinction and without incident. For these reasons, I believe we have been wasting millions of taxpayer dollars by conducting witchhunts against homosexuals in the military in an effort to enforce a ban that is ultimately impossible to enforce. I therefore support President Clinton's efforts to remove the ban on homosexuals in the military.

The Joint Chiefs of Staff, however, were worried that an immediate lifting of the ban would hurt morale and combat effectiveness. Therefore, the President and the Joint Chiefs reached an agreement whereby Secretary of Defense Aspin will review lifting the ban and prepare a draft executive order based upon that review by July 15, 1993. In the meantime, the military's current policy remains in effect except that recruits will not be questioned about their sexual orientation, and dismissal cannot occur solely on the basis of their homosexuality. Dismissal proceedings will continue against service members charged with homosexual conduct and such service members will be placed in the Selective Reserve, a status in which they receive no pay or benefits.

I support this compromise and hope that a policy can be developed that will not adversely affect morale nor discriminate against people on the basis of sexual preference. I believe that military discipline should prevent and punish inappropriate sexual conduct in the ranks and that this more general prohibition can replace a ban based exclusively on sexual orientation.

Again, thank you for taking the time to give me your views. Please feel welcome to contact me on other matters of concern to you.

# THE UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS

On November 10, 1775, the Continental Congress passed a resolution authorizing the formation of two battalions of Marines, to be known as ""American Marines."

The resolution required that the men selected be "good seamen or so acquainted with maritime affairs as to be able to serve to advantage by sea."

Samuel Nicholas was commissioned a captain in the Continental Marines. Nicholas, considered to be the first Commandant of the Marine Corps, was charged by the Congress with the responsibility for raising the force of Marines.

So, along with another notable from the Corps' past, Robert Mullan, later commissioned a captain, the two Marine Officers set up the first Marine Corps Recruiting station, at Tun Tavern, in Philadelphia. By December, 1776, they had raised a battalion of Marines numbering 300.

That was the beginning of a long and illustrious history of tradition, bravery, and sacrifice by young Americans with a burning desire to serve their country as Marines. Much has been written about the activities of the Marine Corps, since its inception in 1775 - from its first amphibious raid into the Bahamas and the Battle of Trenton in the Revolutionary War, to the famed battles against Barbary Pirates along the "the shores of Tripoli, in the early 1800s, to the War of 1812, and on up to both World Wars, Korea, Vietnam, the Gulf War, and now Somalia.

Our 'Ambassadors in Green" have set foot on every major continent in the world - under peaceful terms, or under arms - but effective doing both. Today the Marine Corps serves as a highly specialized amphibious assualt organization - utilizing a single weapons system - known as the Air/Ground Task Force - the principal means of projecting naval power ashore.

Today, our Corps is undergoing the most extensive modernization program in its history, and the quality of todays recruits has never been better. Their spirit comes from those who served before them. They stand ready to serve - Wherever and whenever needed! Second to none!


