

#### 1968 'TURNPIKE MARINE' MURDER RE-INVESTIGATED

On October 17, 1968, Marine MPs signed Corporal Robert Daniel Corriveau into the Naval Hospital in Philadelphia. He had been escorted there from his home in Massachusetts after several violent outbursts prompted calls to the police and then Marine Corps authorities.

The thrice wounded Viet Nam combat vet was home on leave when the incidents occurred. In the Philadelphia Naval Hospital he was confined to a locked down secure facility where visitors were not allowed. While there he was permitted neither leave nor liberty but somehow managed to avoid a

0730 muster on Nov. 18, 1968.

Forty miles away at the Downingtown interchange on the Pennsylvania Turnpike **State Trooper Brian McDevitt,** on patrol at 1030, noticed what looked like a human form propped up against a fence. The trooper stopped his vehicle and found the unconscious male with a Navy Pcoat covering him and the trooper realized that he was dead.

Later, an autopsy would find that he had been stabbed in the chest and had succumbed to the wound. The Trooper performed a quick search for identification, found none, and made the notifications that would start an investigation that has lasted for more than 44 years.

Over the course of the investigation there were several investigators assigned but their work was hampered by the fact that the dead man was unidentified and his place of origin unknown.

Back at the Naval Hospital on that Monday morning in November Cpl. Corriveau, having missed a morning muster, was in an Unauthorized Absence state, then 10 days later declared AWOL (absent without leave), and finally on Dec.

#### **ACMC** to Lead Afghanistan War Effort and Drawdown

WASHINGTON, Oct 10 (Reuters) --President Barack Obama on Wednesday nominated General Joseph F. Dunford Jr., the No. 2 Marine officer, to lead the war effort in Afghanistan and oversee plans to withdraw most of America's combat forces from the country by the end of 2014.

Dunford, if confirmed by the U.S. Senate, would replace **General John Allen**, who took over

command of the Afghan mission in July 2011 and was nominated by the President today to become supreme alli-



ed commander in Europe.

Dunford, who served in Iraq, has been Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps since October 2010, had been widely expected to take charge of U.S. and NATO troops in Afghanistan as Allen rotated out of the post.

"If confirmed by the Senate, he will lead our forces through key milestones in our effort that will allow us to bring the war to a close responsibly as Afghanistan takes full responsibility for its security," Obama said in a statement.

#### HONORARY LIFE MEMBER BILL NEIS DIES AT 93

Honorary Life Member Bill | Rt. 611.

Neis, who was the longest serving Mayor of Doylestown, died Sept. 22. He was 93.

For more than 20 years, Bill managed the annual Doylestown Memorial Day Parade. The parade is the oldest parade in Pennsylvania and arguably the oldest in the nation. As Bill once told his successor as Parade Marshal, "Doylestown had a Memorial Day Parade before there was a Memorial Day."

He was the Guest of Honor at our Birthday Ball in 1996. Bill was made an Honorary Life Member of the Central Bucks Detachment at that Ball. His wife Doris served on the committee which produced the Veterans and Community Service Memorial at the south entrance to Doylestown on

Born in Doylestown, he was the son of the late Edward & Anna (Major) Neis.

He had distinguished careers. First, he was a Master Sergeant in chemical warfare for the U.S. Army during World War II, run-

ning nightime convoys. Then, he was owner & CEO of William Neis & Son, Doylestown's soft drink bottler and beverage distributorship. He was also the State Director of the PA Bottlers Association.

Finally, he served as the Mayor of Doylestown, retiring after 25 years of volunteer service to the community as the longest serving Mayor in Doylestown history, earning him the title of "The Doylestown Cupid" after performing thousands of weddings for local couples.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by his son William, daughter Katerine, four grandchildren, and six great-grandchildren.

A Funeral Mass was held on Sept. 25 and he was buried at St. Mary's Cemetery.

#### 7th SERGEANT MAJOR OF THE MARINE CORPS DIES

Henry H. Black, the 7th Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps, died at his home in Fredericksburg, VA, onAug. 24. He was 83.

SgtMaj. Black served in combat at the Chosin Reservoir during the Korean War, earning two medals for his valor, and two tours in Vietnam.

He was born in Imperial, PA, on Feb. 9, 1929. A high school graduate of Findley High School in 1947, he enlisted in the U. S. Marine Corps on Apr. 12, 1948, and underwent recruit training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, SC. He was assigned to the 2nd Marine Division at Camp Lejeune, NC, after completing boot camp and served with Company C, 1st Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment, and later, with Headquarters and Service Company, 1st Battalion, 6th Marine Regiment.

Ordered to Korea in 1950, Black joined Company H, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, as the Commanding Officer's driver. As a Private First Class, he earned the Silver Star and Bronze Star Medals for heroic actions.

He returned to the States in May 1951 and was assigned to the security force at Marine Barracks, Dahlgren, VA. He completed Recruiters School at Parris Island in July 1953 and became the NCOIC, Recruiting Substation, Allentown, PA.

Black served as a Platoon Commander of a heavy machine gun platoon with 1st Battalion, 9th Marines, 3rd Marine Division, in the Western Pacific area from August 1956 to November 1957 when he was ordered to Parris Island to attend Drill Instructor School.

Upon completion of the course, he served consecutively as a Junior Drill Instructor, a Senior Drill Instructor, and finally, as a Chief Drill Instructor in the Recruit Training Regiment.

In August 1960, he was transferred

to Wheeling, WV, where he served as Noncommissioned Officer-in-Charge of the Recruiting Substation for the next four years. He served as a Company First Sergeant with Company D, 1st Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, from August 1964 to November 1965, and landed with the Marines sent to the Dominican Republic during that period.

Ordered to Vietnam in January 1966, Black served as First Sergeant of Company A, 1st Battalion, 1st Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, until February 1967. He was then assigned as First Sergeant of Casual Company, and later, as the Sergeant Major, Headquarters Battlion, Marine Corps Development and Education Command, Quantico, VA.

SgtMaj. Black began his second Vietnam tour in June 1969, serving as Sergeant Major of the 2nd Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division. He was awarded his second and third Bronze Star Medals during this tour.

Returning to the States in April 1970, he was assigned as Sergeant Major of the Recruiting Station in Richmond, VA. He remained in that

billet until August 1972, when he was transferred to Bremerton, WA, as Sergeant Major of the Marine Barracks there.

Sergeant Major Black was ordered to Iwakuni, Japan, in November 1973, as Sergeant Major of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, serving until November 1974, when he returned to the Marine Corps Development and Education Command as Sergeant Major of that command until his selection as Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps.

Black assumed the post of 7th Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps on June 1, 1975.

Following his Marine Corps career, he served with the Department of Veterans Affairs Central Office in Washington, DC.

Sergeant Major Black's personal decorations include the Silver Star Medal, three Bronze Star Medals (with Combat V), the Purple Heart, the Navy & Marine Corps Commendation Medal, the Combat Action Ribbon, four Presidential Unit Citations, eight Marine Corps Good Conduct Medals, the Navy Occupation Service Medal, two National Defense Service Medals, the Korean Service Medal with four battle stars, the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, the Vietnam Service Medal with four battle stars, the Korean Presidential Unit Citation, the Vietnam Cross of Gallantry (unit citation), the Vietnam Civil Actions (unit ciation), the United Nations Service Medal, and the Vietnam Campaign Medal.

Survivors include his wife of 60 years, Fannie M. Black; four children, Michael J. Black, Debora A. Carter, Catherine L. Thomas and David A. Black, and their spouses; 10 grandchildren; one great-granddaughter; two sisters; two brothers; and numerous nieces and nephews.

He was buried Aug.29 with full military honors in the Quantico National Cemetery.

17, 1968, he was declared a deserter. The war in Viet Nam was in a full blown state and the ranks of all the services were heavy with AWOL and deserter members.

The body found on the Pike had no identification but there was a tattoo on each arm. A nondescript bird in flight appeared on his left arm but on his right arm there was the Marine Corps Bulldog wearing a WWI helmet with the letters USMC.

As Investigator **Cpl. Tom Waters**, a former Marine, said "You don't have a tattoo like that unless you have been in the Marine Corps." There were other clues on the body that might have helped, a healed bullet wound on his upper arm and a scar from a partially amputated finger.

The early investigators visited the Naval Hospital in Philadelphia, sought information on missing patients and employees, and were stymied when no one identified the photos.

Visits to a tattoo parlor and inquiries to the Philadelphia Police likewise produced no results. Fingerprints of the deceased were not on file with any queried agency. Available leads were exhausted and the case remained cold and the unidentified body interred in the Longwood Cemetery in Kennet Square, PA, with no marker to identify the deceased.

In the summer of 2009, **Trooper Patrick Quigley**, one of the cold case investigators, attended a course and learned of a new center that attempted to identify victims by DNA. He thought this case of the Turnpike Marine was

a good candidate for this technology and began his quest anew to put a name to the murder victim. The body was exhumed, another autopsy performed, and DNA samples extracted. The samples were submitted for comparison with databases and no hits arose.

The Internet age has produced some remarkable situations and has provided users with information and sites unavailable years ago. Amateur sleuths arose out of this internet age and they have become adept at matching unidentified remains with those reported missing. One such sleuth is **Richard Bergren**, a former naval officer, who had had some experience with recovery of WW II ser-

vicemen, their identification, and locating next of kin. His efforts linked the unidentified Turnpike Marine with the missing person last seen alive in Pennsylvania. A DNA sample was taken from his sister in New Hampshire for comparison. Recent DNA test results have positively identified the Turnpike Marine as Corporal Robert Daniel Corriveau and arrangements will be made to disinter him and render suitable Marine Corps honors and burial. His sister has informed me that his status as a deserter has not yet been revoked but it is likely that he will be placed on active duty and Honorably Discharged. The murder investigation is still open.

#### SEEKING HELP WITH MURDER INVESTIGATION

On Nov. 18, 1968, Marine Corporal Robert Corriveau was found along the Pennsylvania Turnpike near the Downingtown interchange. He had been stabbed once through the heart.

Through a series of errors, he was not positively identified until early this year--44 years later.

Corriveau had been a patient at the Philadelphia Naval Hospital and was being held in a secure area after having had a series of psychotic outbursts at his home in Massachusetts. Efforts are being made to secure records from the hospital from archives. Preliminary information indicates that the Marine Corps held its own musters and accounted for its own patients at the hospital.

I am a former Marine and retired NYPD Detective Lieutenant and together with Retired Detective Tom Nerney have been retained by a member of the family to investigate the homicide. Our efforts are pro bono and through this notice we are trying to locate and speak to Marines and Naval Personnel who were present at the PHILADELPHIA NAVAL HOSPITAL FROM OCTOBER 1968 UNTIL DECEMBER 1968 either as patients or staff


Cpl. Corriveau was classified as a deserter until he was positively identified. His body which had been in an unmarked grave and was exhumed earlier. He wias reinterred in Massachusetts on Oct. 13. In his casket pinned on Dress Blues were the three Purple Hearts he was awarded plus other medals.


