## Gen. Raymond G. Davis Dead at 88

**Gen. Raymond G. Davis**, 88, former Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps whose decorations included the nation's two highest awards for bravery, the Medal of Honor and the Navy Cross, died Sept. 3 at a hospital in Conyers, GA, after a heart attack.

Gen. Davis, a resident of Stockbridge, GA, served in World War II, the Korean War and the war in Vietnam. He was one of the most decorated Marines of his generation.

During World War II, he took part in the fighting for Guadalcanal, an epic in the Marine Corps history of the Pacific war. He also served in the campaign for Peleliu, one of the bloodiest battles of the war, and it was there that he earned the Navy Cross.

In the Korean War, Gen. Davis, then a Lieutenant Colonel, commanded the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines, during the campaign at the Chosin Reservoir on the border of

Along the way, a shell fragment struck his helmet and two bullets tore through his clothing. Having accomplished his mission, he led his battalion out of the mountains, taking all of his wounded with him.

"By his superb leadership, outstanding courage, and brilliant tactical ability, LtCol. Davis was directly instrumental in saving the beleaguered rifle company from complete annihilation and enabled [two] Marine regiments to escape possible destruction," his Medal of Honor citation read.

In the Vietnam War, Gen. Davis commanded the 3rd Marine Division along the demilitarized zone between North and South Vietnam. He retired in 1972 as Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps.

In later years, Gen. Davis was chairman of the Korean War Veterans Memorial Advisory Board. He helped lead the effort to create the Korean War Veterans Memorial, on the opposite side of the Reflecting Pool from the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. The Korean memorial was dedicated in 1995.

Raymond Gilbert Davis was born in Fitzgerald, GA, and raised in Atlanta, where his parents ran a grocery. After graduating from Georgia Tech in 1938 with a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering, he entered the Marine Corps. Lt. Gen. Lewis B. "Chesty" Puller, known for his aggressive fighting tactics, was one of his first instructors at basic school and remained his lifelong role model.

Gen. Davis, a trained artillery instructor, received the Navy Cross and the Purple Heart for his actions at Peleliu in September 1944. Wounded in the arm and leg shortly after landing, he stayed with his battalion and engaged point-blank enemy cannon fire to rally his forces and reestablish defense positions.

Between wars, he held a series of administrative jobs. After promotion to Brigadier General in 1963, he was Assistant Chief of Staff at Headquarters Marine Corps.

From 1968 to 1969, he was Commanding General of the 3rd Marine Division in Vietnam. He told his intelligence staff to answer one question: "Where will I find the most enemy?"

He favored lighter command forces, namely helicopters full of troops, that could deploy quickly and then shock the opponents with men and firepower.

In addition to the Medal of Honor and Navy Cross, his decorations included two awards each of the Distinguished Service Medal, the Silver Star, the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star Medal and the Purple Heart.

In July, Gen. Davis reminisced about his military career, recalling several "nicks" he got.

"Never lost a day of duty. Luckiest guy in the world," he told the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution*. "Bullet through the skin here" -- he pointed to his forehead -- "one through the skin of my side, a sliver through my knee, a mortar shell that hit my helmet and knocked me down, that kind of thing.

Survivors include his wife of 61 years, Willa Heafner "Knox" Davis of Stockbridge; three children, Raymond "Gil" Davis Jr. of Covington, GA, Gordon Miles Davis of Seminole, AL, and Willa Kerr of Stockbridge; seven grandchildren; and two great-grandsons.

#### WHITE HOUSE SUPPORTS CONCURRENT RECEIPT

The Bush administration has agreed in a deal with House Republican leaders to support concurrent receipt of full retired pay and veterans' disability compensation, backing a five-year phased end of the offset that reduces pay for about 700,000 people eligible for both benefits, Congressional sources said. But the cost of getting President Bush's backing for full concurrent receipt could be so high that military and veterans groups who have been pushing for concurrent receipt will refuse to accept the White House offer.

Sources involved in talks with the White House and Pentagon said that in return for allowing those who have served 20 years to receive full retired and disability pay, White House budget officials want a revision of veterans' disability payments.

The White House proposes giving future benefits or an increase in current disability only to those with injuries or illness linked directly to service.

This could cut the number of new claims by 40 percent and prevent many veterans who get disability payments from seeing increases as their health worsens.

Limiting disability compensation isn't a new idea. Until it stopped producing the reports a few years ago, the Congressional Budget Office usually included in its annual report about ways to cut federal spending a proposal to restrict benefits for service-connected disabilities to those that had some direct link to being in the military. CBO argued that someone injured in an off-duty accident or who came down with an ailment while in the military did not have to be covered.
